Our Focus Value for this Half Term

This half term, we are focussing on our school value of Independence. We aim for children to understand that they can make a difference to the world and they must live out the value of independence to ensure that they are taking responsibility for their actions and their environment every day. The learning environment is pivotal to the success of our

children and our team as this is something that really shows how we value our school and our learning.

We started with an assembly this week about the All Blacks (New Zealand Rugby Team) and the children thought about what made them so successful. We had a look at some of the details about the team and how they behave. Marking and Feedback Procedures

Monday's Inset also saw the launch of our new marking and feedback policy. We have used evidence based research to inform our new procedure and the effective use of this will drive part of our school improvement for this term and beyond.

At Ashford Hill we believe that for <u>effective</u> learning to happen, pupils need to;

- Feel that their work and effort is valued and acknowledged
- be actively involved in feedback discussions with the teacher and each other to build knowledge and understanding of cognitive and metacognitive strategies
- be challenged and supported appropriately by the learning activities, higher order questions and stimulating environment
- see learning modelled by staff
- have chances to connect their learning in many and varied ways
- have planned opportunities to revisit and review their learning at key points
- fully understand the learning intentions for the lesson
- understand, and help develop where appropriate, the success criteria that they can use to assess their own learning against
- learn to self-assess their own and other pupils' learning.

Alex Quigley - Writing Inset

As you are aware, we have been concentrating on improving reading and inspiring young readers over the past year. We have been successful at this and the end of year outcomes are looking particularly strong – 100% of our new year R readers are on track or above age related expectations for reading already. As part of our Trust conference, we were lucky enough to join Alex Quigly for training on the last day of term. As a team, we looked at our current provision in reading and writing and evaluated the effectiveness of both. We were excited to listen to Alex and his tips for improving writing across the school and have been inspired to try some new ideas within our teaching and delivery of the writing process. Alex did continue to promote that great readers, make great writers; reading is a fundamental skill for all children. As we look forward to next year, we will be focussing on the reading curriculum for our Key Stage Two children and the structure of guided reading sessions. I am pleased to say that we will be collaborating with the White Knight English Hub to adapt and renew our current guided reading curriculum. This is a project that I am personally really excited about and I look forward to sharing more with you about this over the coming months.

Curriculum Design

This academic year we have invested in a curriculum programme called Cornerstones. Over the year, we have worked hard to implement our new learning journeys along with some interesting hooks and outcomes. The end of last term saw parents invited in to share their child's learning in the classrooms. It was fabulous to see parents being taken on taxi rides through the streets of London by our chestnut children, showcases of stunning homework and workshops on child development from Hornbeam class, exploding volcano experiments in Oak and a focus on the inspiring movers and shakers from the past in Maple class. The knowledge our children have gained during these projects is impressive. Teachers have worked hard on this term's learning journeys and we are going to continue developing the cornerstones curriculum for our children to achieve the best outcomes in all areas of their learning. We can not wait to share this with you at the showcase in July.

SEN Update

Barbara Hunter will be continuing in the role of SENCO for this term as well as in her role as our School Improvement Partner. She has worked extremely hard over the last half term with Mr Roberts to ensure that all of our children have been assessed for any potential barriers to their learning. This has been a huge undertaking and the result is going to ensure that we have good systems and processes in place to support all children in their learning. The team have been trained in the new SAP reports and they will be contacting you shortly to share summer targets with you if your child is on the SEN register. Attendance and New Attendance Policy

Attendance in high on the agenda nationally. Although our attendance rates are consistent, as a whole school our attendance rate is only just in line with the national average at 94.7%. We aim to achieve at least 97% attendance each year. We also have a high rate of persistent absentees – we aim to reduce this by working with families also. As a result, we have implemented a new attendance policy. Here is some further information.


The Strategic Approach

Ashford Hill Primary School adopts the 5 Foundations of Effective Attendance Practice framework, this is modelled on the work of Professor Katherine Weare. The emphasis is on developing a school culture and climate which builds a sense of connectedness and belonging to ensure all children can attend school and thrive. The approach ensures we prioritise building solid working relationships with children, and parents, prior to escalation. The staged approach we follow ensures we identify triggers early that can lead to poor attendance issues such as mental health issues, lack of trust, communication and relationship breakdowns and the possible lack of networking opportunities both internal (inschool) and external (external agencies).

Aims of the 5 Foundations strategy

- Increase school Attendance and reduce Persistent Absence to meet set targets.
- Ensure Attendance is well managed within the school, with the appropriate level of resources allocated.
- Enable the school to make informed use of attendance data to target interventions appropriately, focusing on the key demographic groups highlighted in the 2022 DFE attendance paper.

Punctuality

Doors open for children at 8.45 am, the class register will close at 9 am. Children arriving after the close of registration will be recorded as late. Late marks will not be authorised and will count as an absence for the school AM session.

Punctuality is recorded and this will be added to your child's record of attendance, a letter will be sent to parents every half term regarding attendance concerns of a child. If a child

arrives at school from 9.05 am they will be U coded. The absence will only be authorised if a satisfactory explanation for the late arrival can be provided, for example, attendance at a medical appointment. The absence will be recorded as unauthorised if a child has arrived late without justifiable cause, for example they woke up late or were waiting for their uniform to dry.

Leave during term time

From 1st September 2013, the Government amended the England (Pupil Registration) (England) Regulations 2006. Head teachers may only grant leave in 'exceptional circumstances' only. Ashford Hill Primary School observes Hampshire County Councils attendance guidance and penalty notice policy. Parents wishing to apply for leave during term time must send a written request for the attention of the Headteacher before making any arrangements. Retrospective requests will not be considered and therefore will result in the absence being categorised as unauthorised.

Each leave during term time request will be considered on an individual basis. If a child fails to return and contact with the parent has not been made or received, school may take the child off the school's roll in compliance with the Education (Pupil registration, England) Regulations 2006. This means that the child may lose their school place. If the permission to take leave is not granted and the child is still absent from school, the absence will be unauthorised. In such cases the school may consider legal action.

Only in exceptional circumstances will absence be agreed. In such cases, consideration will be given to the cultural needs and the family circumstances, such as minority ethnic children returning to their country of origin. In these cases, granting leave for longer periods than normal may be considered justified. In all cases though, parents will be required to justify why the leave needs to be taken during term time.

Lunches and New Menu


